

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Mental Health in Schools is a new initiative supported and funded by the Government of Alberta. Positive mental health is a critical component of academic success. Students who experience positive mental health are better able to learn, achieve success and build healthy relationships. The initiative focuses on providing mental health prevention and promotion. As each school and community is unique, services are tailored to address the needs of the student population.

Two designated Mental Health Coaches work in Lilian Schick, Bon Accord Community School and Legal Public School; three days a week, spending half days at each school. Being present in the schools allows students, families and staff to connect with the Mental Health Coaches. Services offered but is not limited include, facilitating social and emotional learning/skill building groups for students, providing students with strategies when they are having difficulty managing their emotions (self-regulation), after school information presentations on various mental health topics for parents and creating partnerships with community agencies. Please note that the Mental Health Coaches do not provide counselling or therapeutic services.

Topics we will be discussing during our visits into your child's classroom in Legal will include:

- · Respect
- Kindness
- · Responsibility
- Courage
- Worry
- · Healthy relationships/ boundaries

## Kimochi Yorner



In April, we have been working on the Kimochi's Keys to Communication. So far, we have covered the first 5 keys; getting someone's attention, using a talking voice, using a talking face and body, choosing helping words, and redoing hurtful moments. In the lessons we talk about different aspects of communication from body language and verbal communication to reading social cues. During our lessons we have used the Kimochi characters to act out common scenarios and we have discussed how this connects to interactions that happen around our school environment. These were some interesting and helpful conversations! We will be continuing the keys in May where we will be discussing 'being kind and letting others redo' and 'assuming the best'! Updates from the Board of Trustees for our Sturgeon Public school community April 2023



#### **Trustee Handbook**

The Board of Trustees has developed a new Trustee Handbook that outlines the beliefs, policies and practices related to Board Governance. The Trustee Handbook is a crucial tool to help Trustees lead by example in all decisions and activities, ultimately benefiting public education and the students at Sturgeon Public Schools.

An excellent governance culture is characterized by a Board that consistently operates in an environment of trust, respect and professional demeanor. The Board sets the tone for the entire Division in how it carries out its governance responsibilities, and the handbook contains clear statements and explanations of the connections between policy and application and the process where the direction of the organization is set that guides the Board's decision-making processes.

The handbook includes expectations and procedures for individual trustees, both as members of the Board and as representatives of the communities that elected them. Trustees are expected to govern themselves accordingly. As per policy 225, the Board evaluates itself annually against Board effectiveness in meeting policies, norms, principles, protocols and expectations contained in this handbook to continually improve its governance practices.

The Board of Trustees believes that transparency and accountability are essential in ensuring public confidence in its operations and conduct. That is why the handbook has been shared on the Division website.

#### **The 2023 Education Planning Assurance Report**

Each year, the Sturgeon Public Schools Education Planning team releases their Education Planning Assurance Report. This Report outlines the various ways the Division is ensuring that:

- 1. Sturgeon Public students demonstrate strong achievement across provincial learning outcomes, engage critically and continuously progress as learners;
- 2. Sturgeon Public teachers and principals demonstrate all dimensions of the Teaching or Leadership Quality Standard in a collaborative culture of learning; and
- 3. All students belong and learn in environments that support their needs. Public confidence is built when system resources are used to ensure optimum learning for all.

#### **Updated Policies: 110, 115 & 125**

Policy 110 was amended to include an additional clause, which addresses the importance of celebrating student and staff cultures and collaborating with community and cultural leaders to build connections to those cultures.

NEW GFL will be picking up large items curbside on

TUESDAY, JUNE 6 ONLY starting at 7 A.M.

Be sure to have **all items out** for collection **by end of day <u>MONDAY</u>, <u>JUNE 5</u>.** 

#### Special notes:

- All large items are to be put out at the front of your property for collection (no back alley collection).
- All items must be less than 6 feet by 3 feet (1.8 metres x 0.9 metres) and weigh less then 200 lbs. (90 kg).

#### Some examples of acceptable items for collection include:

- Stoves
- Barbecues (no tanks)
- Washer & Dryers
- · Lawnmower (all fluid drained)
- Mattress & Box Springs
- · Rain Barrels

- Furniture
- Snowblower (all fluid drained)
- Sinks

- Lawn furniture
- Toilets
- Wheelbarrow

The following items will NOT be picked up by GFL or the Town and is the responsibility of the Homeowner:

Agricultural chemical containers, liquids, paint, sewage/septic tanks, hazardous waste, toxic waste, chemical or chemical waste, radioactive waste, oil & filters, tires & rims, vehicle hulks, antifreeze, asbestos, tar, drums, batteries, animal waste.

RV Fridges and Freon bearing appliances require a \$20.00 disposal fee payable <u>prior</u> to pick up. Call the Town Office to pay & register for Freon pickup.
